When should teachers wash their hands

- Upon arrival to work and before leaving
- Before and after eating or handling/preparing food including handling raw food items, after removal of gloves
- After contact with body fluids, including blood, emesis, saliva, nasal secretions, urine and stool
- After using the restroom or assisting a child in using the restroom
- After changing a diaper, don't forget to clean the surface you used
- After contact with trash or cleaning items
- Before and after caring for a wound
- Before and after handling of medications

When should children wash their hands

- Upon arrival and before leaving
- After contact with body fluids (blood, emesis, urine, stool, saliva, nasal secretions) including putting hands in their mouths, nose or eyes, wiping their nose, or touching a wound
- After using the restroom
- Before and after eating
- After outside play
- After contact with animals
- When hands look or feel dirty
- After contact with animals
- After outside activities
- When hands look or feel dirty
